

Real Vision

25 November 1993 - 13 February 1994

Exacting representation has had a long history in western art, reaching a zenith with the Flemish and Dutch Masters of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. There have been several revivals of what is broadly termed 'realism', particularly in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Since the nineteenth century the influence of photography has played a significant part in reshaping imagery which has long been associated with perceived reality. Today internationally, there are still many artists active who have strong leanings towards traditional objectivity and motif concern.

Real Vision explores representational painting in both an historical and contemporary sense and will be thematically integrated within two distinct sections of the exhibition. It presents both European and New Zealand artists approaches to the perception of the real world.

In traditional academic art training the still life, or common object was considered to embody many of the essentials that an artist required to test powers of observation and interpretation. Mastery of still-life opened the way to dealing with a whole range of subjects that included the figure, the portrait, animals and the landscape.

The historical section of **Real Vision** is based around this premise. Visitors will experience ten different sequential themes beginning with still-life and ending in the landscape and the fantastic beyond, where all themes merge in a reality of the mind.

Many of the works exhibited are from the Gallery's own collections but forty five paintings have been borrowed from other public and private sources.



Festivals, Rituals and Ceremonies

Glenn Jowitt

21 October - 21 November

Images from many countries are brought together for this photojournalistic exhibition. Glenn Jowitt hopes that **Festivals**, **Rituals and Ceremonies** will share and celebrate religious, cultural and family activities practised in the countries represented in his photographs. These countries include: Egypt, China, Greece, India, the Netherlands, Thailand, Turkey and the United Kingdom.

In documenting the customs focussed on in this exhibition, Jowitt endeavours to communicate not only information but also an understanding of the various cultures described in his work.

Jowitt trained at the School of Fine Arts, University of Canterbury, completing a Diploma of Graphic Design with Honours in Photography in 1975. The following year he worked as a photographer at the Robert McDougall art Gallery. He has been travelling extensively, exhibiting and publishing his work since 1978. Positions occupied by Jowitt include Lecturer in Photography at the School of Fine Arts at the University of Auckland, Photographer/Designer at the Pacific Islanders Educational Resource Centre, Auckland, Head of Department for Photography at the Auckland Society of Arts Art School and tutor at the Auckland Technical Institute.

Lineage

25 November 1993 - 27 January 1994

Works such as *Tomorrow will be the* same but not as this is and As there is a constant flow... saw Colin McCahon demonstrating new ways to respond to the New Zealand landscape. Lineage uses contemporary works from the collection to examine some of the directions artists, inspired by McCahon's innovations, developed when examining this theme.

The exhibition features paintings employing a predominantly expressionist or abstract expressionist style. It explores the emotive layers of reference embodied by this technique and its sensuous use of materials.

t'ARTing up town

The windows of vacant buildings around town will be used to display art over a four month period beginning 20 October. There will be six sites with each exhibition period being a month (unless the building is leased!)

The work featured in the windows will be that of local artists and will encompass a diversity of styles and mediums ranging from site specific installations to easel paintings. A publication documenting this project will be produced at its conclusion.

Look for details about exhibition dates, sites and artists in the papers soon. This project has been initiated by the Christchurch Community Arts Council with the support of the Southern Regional Arts Council and the Robert McDougall Art Gallery.

Women's Suffrage Commemorative Wall Hanging

An appropriate way to celebrate one hundred years of Women's Suffrage in New Zealand was to have a project which involved as many women as possible. The Christchurch City Council achieved this aim when they commissioned a wall hanging to be made by the Canterbury Embroiderers Guild. One hundred members of the guild stitched approximately 24000m of cotton and wool onto a piece of fabric measuring 9m x 2m. Working in three hour shifts, the guild members took eight months to complete a project which would normally, at a more leisurely pace, take two years!

Di Ffrench, a Dunedin based artist who enjoys an international reputation as a photographer, sculptor and performance artist was chosen for this commission. Her concept with its unique creativity and dainty and simplicity of design would be easily translated into stitch.

Each motif is rich in meaning and incorporated into the design are the commemorative dates, 1893-1993. The triangular structure throughout the work represents the fault line running through New Zealand and the shapes found in Taniko weaving. Included also are the four natural

elements: earth, air, fire, and water. The bridge symbolises the opening up of new horizons and opportunities in women's lives over the last one hundred years. The five female figures stand for cultural diversity in New Zealand. Specifically designed for Canterbury is the right hand panel where the nor west wind is indicated by the waving lines in the background, around the head of the woman who holds the 1893-1993 emblem.

Gallery Statistics 1992-1993

The Gallery's statistics for the budget year 1 July 1992 to 30 June 1993 show another successful year with bumper attendances. Some figures: 32 exhibitions, 17 cultural events (openings, performances) took place, 8 corporate evenings were arranged, 91 works were acquired, 142 works on paper and 17 oils were conserved, the Gallery received sponsorship from 4 sources, 20 newspaper articles were written, 393 curatorial enquiries, 4983 general enquiries, 142 conservation enquiries, 289 volumes were added to the library, 2 major catalogues and 6 monographs were published, 10 boxes of artists papers were added to the archives, 26 gallery guides were active; the McDougall Annex attracted 45,544 visits. and the Robert McDougall Art Gallery had 176,899 visits, making a grand total of 222, 443 attendances for the year. This was achieved within budget by 14 fulltime, 4 part-time and 6 weekend attendants.

Review

Rembrandt to Renoir Trip - a day trip -

On Friday 6 August a group of sixteen art lovers left Christchurch for Auckland to see the Rembrandt to Renoir exhibition. An early start paid off and we were inside the Auckland City Art Gallery and on a guided tour by 9.00am - an hour before the public crowds were allowed in.

The audio-visual and acoustic tours were excellent and proved popular with the group. Those who went on the trip were excited by the exhibition and pleased they had made the effort to go.


New Appointments

Vincent van Gogh His Sources, Genius and Influence

2-5 December 1993

In early December Penelope Jackson will lead a tour to see *Vincent van Gogh - His Sources, Genius and Influence* at the National Gallery of Victoria in Melbourne.

The exhibition has been curated from collections in Holland, France, United States of America, Japan, Britain and Australia. As well as looking at Van Gogh's work the exhibition focuses on those artists who influenced him, and in turn, those artists who were influenced by Van Gogh.

Three Sculptors

an Outdoor Sculpture Project in the Christchurch Botanic Gardens November 1993 - April 1994

As part of the Gallery's programme of events for the summer period, sculptors Neil Dawson, Philip Price and Jeff Thomson have been commissioned by the Gallery to create a site specific works for the Botanic Gardens.

The sculptures will be installed in early November and are to remain on display until April 1994. The objective of the project is to increase public understanding and appreciation of innovative contemporary sculpture in New Zealand.

The Gallery, which has not previously undertaken an outdoor sculptural project of this size, will produce a promotional publication to accompany the sculptures. Each site will be fully documented with a map leading visitors to the other two sculptures.

Sculpture and Embroidery

Suffrage Year has prompted Christchurch to produce two outstanding works of art. On 21 July Anna Crighton, the Gallery Registrar and a member of the Suffrage Year Committee, began by asking the audience how many names they knew of the other suffragist women in the sculpture with Kate Sheppard. The completion and siting of Margriet Windhausen's work should help us all to answer such questions. After explaining, with slides, the progress of the sculpture, Anna described and illustrated the enormous embroidery panel commissioned by the City Council to hang in the Town Hall. The scope and details of the planning, design and execution of this magnificent art work are an amazing testimony to the individual and cooperative talents of a large number of women. Di Ffrench as designer and Marianne Hargreaves as project coordinator were the two principals, but the skills of dozens of women from the Canterbury Embroiderers Guild were essential. Fortunately a detailed, multi-media record of this project will be preserved in the National Archives.

Bronwyn Taylor

A passion for history, the culture of women and signs and symbols of women - these are the driving forces of Bronwyn's work as a sculptor, she explained in a talk on 18 August. She does a great deal of preliminary drawing as a means of exploring her ideas and gaining information, and she finds the casting of her figures in bronze much easier with new technology. The double-headed axe, the warrior, the witch and the goddess are favourite themes, and the arrangement of several pieces in relation to each other is also significant to her.
