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

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

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
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## Music — Content and Form

CSA Gallery 12.10 p.m. - 1.10 p.m. Starts Thursday March 1.

Lecture-Piano Recital will be presented by Mr Charles Martin (Mus.B., L.Mus.T.C.L., M.R.S.T., Dip.Tchg.,) in the CSA Gallery. These lecturerecitals will fall into three parts, the first consisting of Mozart's Themes with Variations, and Edward Elgar's Enigma Variations. The Mozart Variations will include his "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" ones, and the lovely K455. Sir Edward Elgar wrote the Enigma Variations for his friends. Mr Martin will discuss the Variations, and these friends, and then play Elgar's musical "pictures" of them, one or two at each recital.

The second part will be devoted to North American music, featuring the imaginative and delightful composer, Edward MacDowell. Each recital will end with a sonata, or pieces by 19th or 20th Century composers, or favourites such as Rubenstein's Melody in F, Dvorak's Humoresque, Paderewski's Minuet in G, and so

## Ormond Wines Art Award, 1979

Ormond Wines Art Award, formerly the Wiahirere Wines Art Award, was founded in 1975 and had its first exhibition in April, 1976. It was then limited to entrants resident in the Auckland and Hawkes Bay provinces, and continued in this format through 1977 and 1978.

It has now been decided to lift the previous provincial restriction, with a view to the Award becoming a national event.

It has been the policy of the Sponsors and the Convenors to aim for what might be called a middle-of-the-road Award, designed not to compete with already established Awards, but rather, by size limitations and the addition of Merit prizes, to establish a competition aimed at the middle group of gifted amateurs and lesser professionals who are not catered for in existing awards, and, in particular, give practical opportunity to those who have not yet made their mark on the national scene. In all other aspects the Award is bound by usual and commonplace standards, and, by establishing and maintaining a policy of obtaining the very best judges available, it is our hope that this Award will become an established one on the national art scene.



## Indoor - Outdoor


3 March - 25 March



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


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

## Rangiora Pottery Group & Friends

27th March - 5 April

This exhibition from a pottery group that has been a vital part of North Canterbury's craft scene for the past 10 years will show the results of its functioning in a mouldering cottage that has been part of the Fernside countryside for well nigh 112 years.

Through the generosity of a local identity the group has had the luck to throw, glaze and fire pots in the original homestead of the Plaskett family. No potter has worked there without the knowledge of Great Aunt Maud's having faded from life in what is now a storeroom. The meeting room which now resounds to loud voices and the scratch of friendly opossums and not so friendly rats was once a locked, forbidden room for reasons never disclosed.

The hundreds of local would-be-and successful potters who have passed through, or stayed with the group have, we hope, produced a style definitive of the groups' locale. Michael Trumic a longstanding friend of the group agreed to be selector and is the guest exhibitor.

Other friends will also exhibit screen-printing and weaving and sculptor Vladimir Rous will show his work.

## Clive Stone – John Perry Collection

1900 - 1920 Photography Exhibition

7 April - 22 April

Clive Stone born 1950, Auckland. Dip.FA (Hons.) in photography, 1973. Published works in New Zealand Photography, Photographs: Universities Arts Festival (1972), Photo-Forum and the Active Eye (1975).

"John Perry, an art teacher at Kaipara College in Helensville, found a cache of half-plate glass negatives under his house when he moved to Helensville eleven years ago. According to legend the woman who previously owned the house had purchased the negatives with the intention of using them to make a glasshouse — she apparently figured that the rain would wash off the emulsion in time, but later decided that the plates were too small for that purpose. Hence they were put out of the way under the house."

Clive Stone found out about them a few years ago and with painstaking care has made a couple of sets of beautiful contact prints off them on Agfa's Portriga Rapid paper.

Rumour has it that the photos were made by a professional photographer in Karangahape Road, Auckland but attempts to find their maker or to date them accurately have not been successful.

The works appear to date from c. 1900-1920 and as an historical sampler of the Auckland community this exhibition is fascinating.

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
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

#### Of her work:

Most of the work was done 1978, Ponsonby, Auckland and includes drawings, paintings, banners and collage. Developing from the space poem and stripe paintings 75-77 the exhibition includes the "Hello Yellow" series exhibited in Auckland 1978.

Why Yellow? How about green? red? blue? Is it a musical or poetic notion? concept or idea? mantra? or just a serial conversation with one colour and its relation to the raw canvas, white, black and eventually other colours. It is a comment on the process of painting itself developing a single idea through different medias and levels whether formal, informal, decorative, mythical, poetic a purely saterical.

Associated drawings inspired by recent travel, letter writing, flight diaries and musical scores becomes a personal calligraphy of fast hieroglyphic marks that develops into the serial imagery of the "long letters" or banners.

"Berlin Suite" — a direct comment on recent experience in Germany betrays intense emotional reaction but subconsciously reveals a type of archetypal imagery hopefully universal rather than just political and local in concern.

In travelling one is forced to experience quick time, space and speed changes, perception is heightened. Fleeting impressions caught by serial photographs, written notes. Actual drawings, paintings done at a distance, months after, at home working spontaneously from idea, memory and association with aim to capture in an abstract way the essence and uniqueness of a section of space in life's personal journey.

## **Edith Wall**

Edith Wall was born and educated in Christchurch, received her art training at Christchurch School of Art, Rome and London, and is living in Melbourne.

Ms Wall worked as a cartoonist on a magazine for six years during the war, and as an art teacher for 10 years. She has held 12 previous exhibitions (in Australia), is represented in galleries in Victoria, South Australia, Tasmania, West Australia and Queensland. She is currently teaching "a small class."

Ms Wall is fascinated with and by the Verandah. As a child she lived in an old house in Christchurch, and even though the verandah on that house faced north and was really too cold for sitting on, it captured her imagination. But it is really the people who use verandahs that she finds fascinating. They are always contented people, in her world of "Verandah People" always relaxing or sleeping or dozily watching the passing scene. She thinks of them as happy people and paints them that way. She likes drawing people - but when they are unaware of it. Ms Wall started painting "awful looking people" when she was two. Today she prefers to paint a mudane surrounding (and most verandah's are surely that) and highlight the people in the picture.

## **Halswell Potters**

The Halswell Pottery Group is holding an Exhibition in Gallery C from April 23rd to May 6th. This exhibition is to be opened by Jeanne Edgar, Director of Risingholme Community Centre, and invited exhibitors are Adrienne Lamb, (Lowburn), guest potter, and Jewel Oliver, (Cashmere) guest artist, with collages. The Halswell Pottery Group was formed 8 years ago, when its headquarters were established in a local farmhouse, and it now has a membership of 80. The Group works in earthenware, stoneware and porcelain, with special emphasis on glaze effects, and handbuilt as well as wheel-thrown pots.

He is represented in the National Art Gallery and in public and private collections in New Zealand and overseas. He is a member of the Auckland, Otago and Canterbury Art Societies, a past exhibiting member of the Royal Art Society of N.S.W. and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts. London.


A regular exhibitor in the Kelleher Art Competition, he has numerous awards to his credit including five firsts. He has also exhibited regularly at the Paris Salon and has been featured in French Art Journals where his work has been compared with that of Ingres. William Dargie. the Australian artist, described his drawing as "impeccable".

This exhibition is made up largely of the original drawings from his book "Patterns of the Past" which was published last year and includes also, essays on landscape, figure painting still life and portrature.

He is not a "cultist" but prefers to react to his visual environment and express it in his own personal way.




