Opening night sales procedure and collection of purchased pots

There will be no sales until after the formal opening by Mr Yuji Ooka at 8pm.

Four sales attendants wearing c oloured sashes will be stationed in the gallery near the pieces for which they are responsible. They have a numbered sales card for each of these pieces.

An intending purchaser should collect the sales card bearing the number of the item being purchased and the sales attendant will mark the piece with a red sticker.

The sales card MUST be presented at the Sales Desk before 9pm and a minimum deposit of 10% paid. A recipt will be issued and this must be presented when the piece is collected. If any Sales Cards are not handed in by 9pm those pieces will be regarded as unsold and their red stickers removed.

Work may be collected from the gallery on Sunday, September 11 between 9am and noon. Bring your receipt and the balance of payment. Uncollected pots will be returned to the CPA workshop at 395 Memorial Avenue.

Mr Yuji Ooka

Mr Yuji Ooka is Counsellor and Consul in the Consular Office of Japan in Christchurch. The Cantebury Potters Association has many strong links with Japanese pottery, beginning with the visit of Takeichi Kawai in 1964 and celebrated most recently by the visit of Soei Obiya. Our Association is indebtedto the Japanese Government, the Japan Foundation and the Consular Office in Christchurch for many of these visits. We are honoured that Mr Ooka has consented to open our exhibition.

Guest Exhibitors

Anthony Bond

Tony Bond spent five years working as a graphic designer and illustrator after completing the Christchurch Polytechnic's Visual Communication Course in 1984. He then entered the final year Wanganui Polytechnic

Fine and Applied Arts Course in 1991, majoring in ceramics and printmaking.

Since graduating from Wanganui, Tony has had work accepted for the Fletcher Challenge Award, has won major awards in the Cleveland, Norsewear and NZSP National Exhibitions.

Of his work Tony writes:

"Clay is the sort of material, that if you let it, can show you a lot. Simply playing with it can be the beginning of something unexpected. Through play, then experimenting, the work I am currently doing has evolved over the past year.

I work directly into the clay, without preplanning or drawing, just a vague idea. The form evolves in my hands, and when finished, suggests the surface imagery. This immediate way of working often produces surprises and sometimes meaning which may not be obvious until well after the work is finished. The process takes time due to the slow drying required and pieces may take a month or more to complete.

As this work progressed, I became aware of a theme developing, and the significance of the symbolism in both the form and the surface imagery. The vessel form is a metaphor for the "living vessel" which carries its dreams, loves, beliefs and demons on its own particular journey. The scraffito imagery reveals what is carried deep within.

The scale is deliberately small, inviting closer inspection and a more intimate appreciation. An important part of this is feeling the form, the weight, exploring the piece with both hands and eyes.

Peter Lange

Peter Lange came to potting twenty years ago after a preparatory career working in freezing works, factories & building sites, boat building, prospecting, cleaning silver at Buckingham Palace and driving a London cab for a year. Peter has twice been a merit award winner in the Fletcher Award and has work in the Beehive and many private collections. Peter helped to found

the Albany Village Pottery in 1975 but now works from his home in Mt. Eden. For the past two years Peter Lange has been Director of the Auckland Potters Centre and editor of the Auckland Society of Potters newsletter.

Peter's work is mostly wheelthrown domestic stoneware and earthenware interspersed by episodes of slip-cast sculptural ceramics which have a "tendency to be ceramic oneliners".

For three months this year Peter has been Artist-inresidence at the Christchurch Polytechnic and the pieces in this exhibition are some of the work from that time, reflecting a little of the Christchurch environment seen through the eyes of Peter Lange.

Margaret Ryley

Margaret Ryley graduated Diploma in Fine Arts from the University of Canterbury and has work in major public collections in New Zealand and in the Kurashiki Folk Museum in Japan.

Margaret has been an influen-
tial member of the Canterbury
Potters Association and the
New Zealand Society of Potters
and as Senior Tutor at the CPA
has guided many Cantabrians on the pathway to an enjoyable
hobby in ceramics and a signif-
icant number to a professional
career as a potter. Quite a few
of those exhibiting in this exhi-
bition have been taught by
Margaret Ryley.

Of her work Margaret writes:

"My pieces usually comprise variations on a limited number of shapes, hollow in form, and domestic in origin/ Although they may hold water, this aspect of usefulness is not what I have in mind when making them. I am looking for life and movement, also colour in surface decoration which will enhance the basic form."
